"That the next generation might put their hope in God."

THEIR STORIES

Evan Westburg Covenant Pastor

I am the Senior Pastor of First Evangelical Covenant Church in Lincoln, NE. Interestingly, the church I now serve is my home church. I spent the first eighteen years of my life being raised and nurtured in the faith by the congregation I now serve. Though I grew up hearing about Covenant Cedars, I did not become a camper until I reached ninth grade. At the urging of a friend, I decided to attend summer camp, and to my surprise - I loved it. Not only did I love it, I could not keep myself away. I soon became one of the first paid counselors, and worked for the next six summers serving in many different roles, from counselor to kitchen staff to managing the tower. *Ultimately, it* did not matter how I served; it was the ongoing relationships and life change that brought me back again and again.

Camps like Covenant Cedars provide fertile ground for youth to encounter Jesus. The amount of life change that can occur in a week of camp may take years in other environments. There are very few places left that provide such space for pause and reflection for youth and adults alike. *Camp changes lives. It changed mine.*

While I have learned many great principles and lessons over the years on how to be an effective and caring pastor, the beginning of my ministry education came through my days at Covenant Cedars. Those were formative years. I learned much about who I was, about how much God truly loved me, and I especially learned how to tell others about God's love shown through Jesus Christ. I hold Covenant Cedars in high regard. It shaped me, and I pray that my children have the same opportunities for growth and change - that they encounter the risen Jesus Christ. Camp changes lives.

I was a camper at Covenant Cedars Bible Camp from 1988-1995. Since then I have served as a staff member at Twin Lakes Christian Resource Center, (lowa), as a pastor in Evangelical Covenant Church with my wife, Lindsay Small, and now serve as Associate Dean at Western Theological Seminary. I owe deep joy and passion to CCBC for preparing me to be a Christian witness and leader in all of these places. I pray that CCBC continues to be a place of hospitality and rest for all who enter its gates. And that the long-standing imprint of loving disciples, (counselors and staff), serving future leaders continues.

Places such as Covenant Cedars are the essential opportunities children, youth, and adults need to get away and grow in Jesus Christ.

My first remembrance of Covenant Cedars is not positive. I was a shy farm kid. The first camp was a combination of homesickness and being overwhelmed by the new experience. It was a rough week in many ways. Caring people helped me weather the storm of that first week. I adjusted so much that I came back to camp as a camper for five more years plus two years on the staff as what was gloriously called a "flunky". Doing dishes, cleaning restrooms, sweeping and mopping floors were my duties for two summers. Those were long hot summer days of work and fun at the same time.

It was at Covenant Cedars where I solidified my decision to accept Christ's call to be my Savior. The experience was so special that I can visualize to this day the setting in the central room of the Wausa cabin. In those days most of the speakers were Covenant pastors. Almost all of the messages ended in an alter call. After several days, my counselor asked if I had made that choice and I said I was not sure. He prayed with me, and it was settled. However, he did not tell me until later that he STRONGLY encouraged me to share that fact at the campfire that night. Traumatized again! But I honored his request and was later glad that I had.

When I was pastor at Mead, I was asked to serve on the camp board. It was during that time we had the privilege to call Dan and Becky Buhr to serve on the staff. They have continued to serve so faithfully over the years. To remember what camp was 60 years ago and what it is today, there is no comparison in the facilities and programming, then and now. The mission has not changed. To lead children, youth and adults to Jesus and encourage them in their walk is what Covenant Cedars is all about.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE AN "ADVOCATE" FOR A CHILD?

We are fervently asking each of our readers to consider how they might advocate for a child to attend camp. In order to help you understand the steps and resources available, here are some basic steps to follow:

Step One:

Earnestly pray that the Spirit would bring to your mind a child in your sphere of influence that could benefit from a "faith building experience" (child, grandchild, neighbor, other relatives or acquaintances).

Step Two:

After praying for them to be receptive, present the opportunity to them and their parents through printed material (available through your church or our web-site).

Step Three:

Offer to help them fill out the registration, (if needed), present transportation options to and from camp, (if needed).

Step Four:

Financing their experience should never be an obstacle to their attending. Most churches offer financial assistance, also you may contact the camp office for a scholarship or consider sponsoring them fully or partially yourself.

Step Five:

See to it that they are ready for the trip to camp and pray for them while they are there.
