After facing verbal discouragement from his older brother, Eliab, David is then exposed to Saul who proceeds to reinforce his inability. Finally, giving in to David's plea to face the giant, Saul then attempts to place all kinds of protective armor on David as well as a sword in his hand. Great intentions by a very powerful and wise man. But in verse 39, we see that David quickly shed all the armor and picked up his sling shot and proceeded to carry out

his calling with the things that he was comfortable with and confident in. Picking up five smooth stones from the stream and placing them in the shepherd's bag, David was now ready to face what was in front of him. David walks toward the giant he is facing with remembrances and faith in one whom had rescued him many times before. The experiences that David had lived while watching the power of a God who he knew was for him and not against him, now prepared him to face any circumstance.

The young people of our day face many giants in a culture that offers more uncertainty than ever before.

As a camp director, I often ask how camp can be just one of those smooth stones that will help lead each one to victory through the challenges of life. My question to parents and guardians is this: are you doing all you can to make those "smooth stones" available to them in their formative years or are you weighing them down with Saul-like armor?

This generation has limitless opportunities, but they also face significant challenges. Life is complicated! The world is smaller! Expectations are huge! How do we help them rise to the occasion and discover all that God has created them to be?

At a Christian camp, kids discover the gift of God's love for them. They have an adventurous time in His creation, stretching their hearts and minds (and legs) to gain a new sense of purpose. And at camp, they discover hope, peace and acceptance.

We pray that you, too, will help us to allow the great "power of camp" to be one of those smooth stones in their arsenal that helps them through life to discover the great purpose and joy that God has for them!
